# Battle for Freedom 2023

## 2nd USCT Re-Enactors

### Visit Manatee

In September the men and women of the 2nd Infantry Regiment of the United States Colored Troops set up camp in the Sam Curry yard, which was occupied by the USCT near the end of the Civil War. Sergeant Major Jarvis Rosier read the Emancipation Proclamation and spoke about the role of the USCT during the Civil War.

Reflections hosted house tours, offered advice on period clothing, and opened the first installment of our new Civil War exhibit. Both the event and exhibit were funded by the Florida Humanities Council.

## **Back to Angola**

In mid-October we celebrated the annual Back to Angola Festival with Oaktree Community Outreach at Manatee Mineral Spring Park. The celebration commemorates the community of freedom seekers that made the spring their home during the 18th and early 19th centuries and celebrates the descendants of those individuals who eventually escaped enslavement and made a new home at Red Bays, Andros Islands, Bahamas. We enjoyed a panel of speakers, wood carving demonstrations. basketry delicious food, and a Junkanoo rush out.





## **Pioneer Spirits**

Reflections hosted our 2nd annual Pioneer Spirits the weekend before Halloween. It featured three vignettes highlighting the changes in American traditions concerning death! The tour began in the Sam G house with a traditional pre-Civil War laying out before moving to the Mary Amelia house to witness a spiritualist from the 1890s. The tour ended with a 1926 house party featuring a tarot reader (for fun only), classic Halloween treats, and warm cider.

## **New Windows**

We have new windows for all three National Register houses! The work was conducted by Specialized Services Group and funded by the Bishop Parker Foundation.

Our 1860s era Sam G and Mary Amelia houses feature two over two light, double hung sash windows. This means that both sashes open and contain two panes of glass each. They are balanced by a weight that hangs inside the window frame.

The 1926 Visitor Center features a combination of four over one and three over one, double hung sash windows. The upper sash features either four or three panes of glass and and the lower sash has one. This type of window is common in historic houses constructed prior to the 1950s, but it is not the only historic window style.






## News from the Gardens

We have offered three gardening workshops since mid-summer. The first was presented by Manatee County Utilities and focused on water conservation practices. We learned about the local water shed, made T-shirts, and received four water barrels for our gardens. Local artist Jakorhi Hall, and his students from Manatee Elementary, helped paint the rain barrels and they were dedicated the same day as the water conservation workshop. Our second workshop, hosted by UF/IFAS explored raised bed gardening, and in the third we learned about composting.

During the summer we did some nematode remediation in the raised beds. UF/IFAS suggested using a cover crop. Depending on what benefits are needed, there are many cover crops to

choose from. We chose Sunn Hemp. It has nitrogen fixing abilities for the soil health AND when chopped up and tilled into the top layer, can create a less than ideal environment for root-knot nematodes. After we chopped the sunn hemp, we solarized (super heat with help from the sun and greenhouse-like conditions) the 2 beds with re-usable plastic sheeting for 6 weeks to further aid in an unkind environment for the nematodes. The beds are now in tip top conditions and bursting with sweet potatoes, spinach, and carrots.





## **Thank You**
